

Web-App "Out into the City!"

The audio walk app for the exhibition "Anything Goes? Berlin Architecture in the 1980s" tells the stories behind the buildings in their actual locations in the city. Three routes lead to important buildings and sites of the International Building Exhibition Berlin1987 (IBA87) in Kreuzberg and to the postmodern buildings in East and West Berlin along Friedrichstrasse.

Online presentation: "Marc Bauer. The Blow-Up Regime"

Marc Bauer (*1975 Geneva, Switzerland) has been awarded the GASAG Art Prize 2020. He uses drawing as a medium to address issues like migration, identity and gender, a critique of new media, and links between religion and violence.

Web-App: "Provenances. Wayfaring Art"

Exhibitions rarely provide room to trace the often labyrinthine journey each work has travelled in its past. Just how kaleidoscopic these stories can be is illustrated by the exhibition "Provenances: Wayfaring Art". A self-portrait by Max Liebermann (1847–1935) painted in 1912 is used as an example. In a hanging that recreates a salon setting, the show features works from the Berlinische Galerie collection that have rarely, if ever, been displayed in the past. https://berlinischegalerie.de/en/digital/provenienzen-kunstwerke-wandern/

Online presentation: "Look at Me! Women's Portraits 1920s"

The 24 works in "Look at Me! Women's Portraits from the 1920s" reveal a diversity of practices in portrait photography in Berlin during the period: Conventional and modernist portraits shot in commercial studios are on show alongside artistic and experimental photography and collage. This online presentation provides a first glimpse into the exhibition and introduces some selected artists and the people depicted in the photographs.

Online presentation: "Out and About. Queer Visibilities in the collection"

Many objects in the collection of the Berlinische Galerie have direct or indirect connections to queer subject matter: because the artists are or were members of the community, or because their art navigates issues of gender identity and sexual orientation. For example, works by Nan Goldin (* 1953), Hannah Höch (1889–1978) and Herbert Tobias (1924–1982) represent perspectives of the LGBTQI* (lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, queer and inter*) communities that are too often overlooked.
