Current exhibitions

“Images in Fashion – Clothing in Art: Photography, Fine Arts and Fashion since 1900”

In the collection of the Berlinische Galerie, fashion emerges as a theme in surprising and diverse ways. Apart from fashion photographs spanning the 20th century, paintings and drawings testify to the role of fashion as a means of expression and representation: from the “reform dress” around 1900 and the Dada dandies of the 1920s to avant-garde clothing designs in today’s art.

This extensive exhibition sheds light on artists’ relationship with fashion, offers a new perspective on works in the collection and introduces recent works of contemporary art.

Nina Canell: “Tectonic Tender”

Nina Canell’s artistic practice does not revolve around the finished artwork; instead, it foregrounds process and synergy. For the Berlinische Galerie, she has conceived an experiential installation that considers the material vitality of calcite. Literally crumbling under our own weight, seven tonnes of shells speak up from the ground, causing a sensation remote from that of walking on a gallery floor. Yet, crushed calcite from marine molluscs is an essential ingredient in concrete, a major constituent of our built environment. Here, the biomineral forms that feed the construction industry break down over the course of the exhibition. Material stress gives way to a sounding, durational sculpture.

“Art in Berlin 1880–1980”

More than 1,000 square metres at the Berlinische Galerie are devoted to our own collection. On display are about 250 paintings, prints, photographs, architectural designs and exhibits from artists’ archives. This tour takes you on a time journey through Berlin: the Kaiser’s era, the Weimar Republic, Nazi dictatorship, new beginnings after 1945, the Cold War in a divided city and the alternative lifestyles that sprouted in the shadow of the Wall in both east and west. Touch models, tactile floor guidance and an



inclusive audio app facilitate access for the blind and partially sighted.
